



Sumdog Contest

During the week of February 22 - 29, some of the students in grades 3-8 participated in the Sumdog's Northeast Regional RPDC Contest. This contest is online and students answered math questions while playing games. The students received points for answering questions correctly. Students from schools around the region participated in the contest. Schools competed against other schools and students competed against students from other schools, as well as their own. The RPDC gave daily prizes to students and schools with the highest score. Linn Co. was the overall winner of the contest and placed first for 6 out of the 7 days. For the daily prize, our school won a Yenka 3D shapes software (worth \$330) site license, and for the overall prize, our school won a certificate and a Yenka Mathematics software (worth \$750) site licenses. The 10 students who answered the most questions correctly overall received a certificate. During the contest, 1232 students, from 18 schools in the region, answered a grand total of 813,830 questions. 65 students from our school answered 91,130 questions correctly. 5 Linn Co. students were in the Top 10. Those students included: Alyssa Dodson, Kevin Alvarenga, Hope Singleton, Madison Livingston, and Trinady Boley. Students who achieved a score of 1,000 or more were treated to a pizza/game party. Preschool Participates in MDA Hop A Thon March 13, 2012 -- Raised \$697.00

Preschool learned about people who have a disability called muscular dystrophy. This disease makes a child's muscles weak. The people with muscular dystrophy may wear leg braces or have a wheel chair to help them get around. However they still like to play and be friends. We talked about how we cannot catch Muscular dystrophy like a cold. People are born with Muscular dystrophy. We discussed how nobody's perfect, everyone is different, but all of us are special. We learned that are bodies are amazing. There are 650 muscles in our body and that is what helps us move. We used our large muscles by flapping our arms like birds and jumping up and down. We used small muscles to point to our nose and then wave good bye. Then we learned that everybody has different abilities. Some of us can color well, others can run fast and some of us can catch a ball. People with Muscular dystrophy have a hard time doing different activities due to their weak muscles.

We talked about how we could help people with disabilities. We could open doors for them, bring them things they need, move things out of their way, but most of all we could be their friend .People with disabilities can play and do things too. They like to be involved in things we do. We discussed that the money we raised is going to help send kids to camp with muscular dystrophy and help doctors and scientists keep working on a cure or medicines to help with muscular dystrophy.

We then had our hop a thon. Our hop a thon was held outside in the nice sunshine. We divided into three groups and each group did a hopping activity and then rotated to the next hopping station. However, we did each activity for two minutes. The hopping activities were hopscotch, jumping through a rope ladder, and hopping from circle to circle. Each student received a sticker and a certificate for hopping and participating in our hop a thon. The students will also receive prizes for the money they raised.

YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR ASSISTANCE WITH YOUR PHONE BILL

The Low Income Connection Assistance Program (*LINK UP*) is a plan to assist qualified low-income applicants with reduced service connection charges. The assistance applies for a single telephone line at the applicant's principal place of residence. A reduction of fifty percent (50%) of all service connection charges or \$30, whichever is less, will be provided to qualified applicants.

The consumer shall receive the benefit of the *LINK UP* program for a second time only for a principal place of residence with an address different from the residence address at which *LINK UP* assistance was previously provided.

The *LIFELINE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM* is a plan which assists qualified lowincome applicants with reductions in their monthly local exchange service rate. The applicant applies for a single telephone line at the applicant's principal place of residence. Qualified applicants shall have their monthly local exchange service rate reduced by the federal support of \$1.75, in addition to the \$6.50 of baseline federal support used either to waive the *LIFELINE* customer's federal end-user common line charges, or to reduce the *LIFELINE* customer's residential rate. Toll blocking is available at no charge to all *LIFELINE* customers.

To be eligible for *LINK UP* and/or *LIFELINE*, an applicant must participate in one of the following:

- A. Medicaid (e.g. Title XIX/Medical, state supplemental assistance)
- B. Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- C. Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- D. Federal Public Housing Assistance
- E. Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LHEAP)
- F. Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF)
- G. National School Lunch Program's Free Lunch Program

An additional \$5.25 in monthly support is available to qualified Lifeline customers through the Missouri Universal Service Fund (MoUSF). Disabled customers or customers with a disabled dependent may qualify for \$3.50 in monthly support through the MoUSF.

You may only receive low-income assistance from one wireline or wireless telephone provider, not both.

If you feel you qualify for either *LIFELINE* or *LINK UP*, call 777 and ask your Grand River Mutual customer service representative to explain the application process.
