

Notes From The Nurse

Immunization Requirements for 2013-2014 School Year.

STUDENTS ENTERING KINDERGARTEN need a second dose of

varicella (chickenpox) vaccine.

If the kindergarten child has had varicella (chickenpox) disease, a licensed doctor of medicine or doctor of osteopathy (DO) may sign and place on file with the school a written statement documenting the month and year of the previous varicella disease as satisfactory evidence of having had the disease. Parental or guardian statements of disease will no longer be accepted. Please visit with your physician or the nurses at County Health to see if your child needs any of his/ her 4-6 year old immunizations.

PRESCHOOL Students will need:

1. Age appropriate pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV) for children attending preschool.

2. For all children who have had varicella (chickenpox) disease, a licensed doctor of medicine (MD) or doctor of osteopathy (DO) may sign and place on file with the child care facility a written statement documenting the month and year of previous varicella disease as satisfactory evidence of having had the disease. Parental or guardian statements of disease has not been acceptable since July 1, 2010.

 All preschool students will need to be up-to-date with their immunizations and provide the school with record of proof of immunizations before being able to attend school.
Missouri Legislation requires that all children age 6 months to 6 years attending a

licensed daycare or preschool program provide documentation of a **recent lead screening**. **This test must have been done within the last year**. If a parent/guardian refuses to have the child tested, they must provide a written statement explaining why they do not want the child tested.

Attention All 7th Grade Students/ Incoming 8th graders

Tdap, which contains pertussis vaccine, is required for students enrolling in the eighth grade for the 2013-2014 school year. State health regulations dictate that students cannot attend school unless they are properly immunized and can provide satisfactory evidence of the immunization or unless they are exempted. Documentation of immunization must include month, day, and year of administration. There is no grace period for compliance to state requirements. If your child is not in compliance they will not be allowed to attend school in the fall. We need proof of immunization before school starts.

Linn Co. R-1 and the Linn Co. Health Department are working together and have scheduled a Immunization clinic for 7th graders. Linn Co. R-1 will take students by bus to Linn Co. Health Department the day of the immunization clinic on March 22, 2013. A consent form from Linn Co Health was sent home with students on January 18th and parents will need to complete the form and return it to the school prior to January 31st. If your student did not make it home with the form, please use the attached form.

Free Vision Screening

I am very happy to announce that the Linn Co. R-1 School has a tentative date of Thursday, March 7 to offer free auto refractive vision screening for children 6 months to 6 years of age in our school district and includes our current students in Preschool, Kindergarten, and 1st grade. The Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation will be conducting the free screening. This screening involves taking a scan of your child's eyes with the Plus Optix auto refractor.

Auto refraction vision testing can detect the presence of six possible eye disorders, nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism, anisometropia (equal refraction), strabismus (misaligned eyes) and cataracts. All of these conditions if left undetected can or may lead to Amblyopia (blurred or lazy eye). Amblyopia can be successfully treated if detected early.

The screening requires no physical contact with your child, parents can hold the child during the screening and poses no risk to their health. A trained technician will conduct the vision screen, and you will be notified of the results. This is to be considered a preliminary procedure, and does not constitute a diagnosis of vision problems. Benefits of Amblyopia Vision Screenings

- All screenings are performed by trained technicians
- Screenings are completely non-invasive
- Screenings will not disrupt classes, technicians require just a darkened room and two to three minutes of a child's time
- The Foundation will provide educational materials and consent forms for parents to sign prior to the screening
- All children screened receive a results card
- Parents are encouraged to schedule an eye exam if any vision abnormalities are found.
- At our last screening, 4 children were referred and all needed glasses to correct a found condition. It is so much easier on a child to have the problem corrected before they fall behind due to a vision problem.

We encourage anyone with a child 6 months to 6 years in the Linn Co. R-1 District to contact the school and let us know that you would like for your child to participate in this free vision screening. We are working with the Lions and should have a date for the screening in the next few days. Apply for your PIN TODAY!!

The PIN Application is for students who want to apply for a Federal Student Aid (requirement to receive A+ funding). You and a Parent need to apply for a pin at www.pin.ed.gov and keep it in a safe place for next year! Your PIN will be used each year to electronically apply for federal student aid and to access your Federal Student Aid records online. If you receive a PIN, you agree not to share it with anyone. Your PIN serves as your electronic signature and provides access to your personal records, so you should never give your PIN to anyone, including commercial services that offer to help you complete your FAFSA. Be sure to keep your PIN in a safe place.

Free Application for Federal Student Aid

The first step in applying for financial aid is to complete the FAFSA. This form is updated annually and is available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Completing the FAFSA is the beginning of the financial aid process. Its purpose is to determine your need for student financial assistance.

You will be asked on the form to provide information about you and your family's income, which will be used to determine your Expected Family Contribution (EFC), the amount of money you and your family are expected to contribute toward your education. The difference between your Expected Family Contribution and the cost of attending school will be your financial "need".

You should complete and return the FAFSA as soon as possible after January 1 of the year in which you want to attend school. Colleges and universities have a specific deadline by which the FAFSA must be completed in order to be considered for financial aid awarded from each college. The deadline for submitting the FAFSA for the Missouri State Aid Programs is April 1 of each year.

If possible, both the student and parent should complete their income taxes before completing the FAFSA. Most importantly - don't' forget to sign it!

FAFSA4caster will help you understand your options for paying for college. By providing some basic information FAF-SA4caster will estimate your eligibility for federal student aid. Your estimate will be shown in the College Cost Worksheet where you can also provide estimated amounts of other student aid and savings that can go towards your college education.

Although there are many academic scholarships, there are also many grant, employment and loan programs that depend on financial need, not grades. Also, there are many private scholarships that look for students who excel in other ways, such as community service, artistic or writing ability, math and/or science skills, or leadership and extracurricular activities.

Federal student aid includes:

Grants: financial aid that doesn't have to be repaid (unless, for example, you withdraw from school and owe a refund) Loans: borrowed money for college or career school; you must repay your loans, with interest Work-Study: a work program through which you earn money to help you pay for school
